ACCREDITED MUSEUM

We've done it!

We have now been accredited with the Arts Council England which "sets nationally agreed standards for UK museums. To qualify, museums must meet standards on how they are managed, for the services they offer and on how they care for collections". WINTER WORKS

Over the winter we have repainted the museum (thanks Peter Abel for the loan of his scaffolding) and the new wiring and lighting has been installed – many thanks to Simon Newman. This will mean that all the lights – in the room and the showcases are operated by a switch pad by the door. As this work necessitated clearing the museum of all the displays and artefacts, Jo and I took the opportunity to re-do all the displays on the ground floor. Whilst we were busy here, The Alfred Williams Heritage Society prepared a display for The Gallery. The lighting has made a terrific difference to the museum and the displays making it much more welcoming, light and airy. We could not have managed without the help of Simon – firstly for taking on the job and then persevering in the face of suppliers going out of business, costs rising and weird viruses. Many thanks to Verity, Cheryl and Jane for their help in getting the museum back to – almost – normal. Do come and visit and see what we have done!

These are now in the Museum for you to see. The 'translations' of his hand written letters are in a red file on the bottom shelf of the Betjeman Files and scanned images of the letters are on the computer on the ground floor – Alt F4 to navigate away from the power point presentation then - C Drive/photographs/Betjeman letters.

WORK GOES ON ...
