'The Beavers brought along their favourite teddy bears and cuddly toys to hear about Archie, share stories about their bears, and to imagined them taking part in different activities. After a session drawing their bears all the pictures were sent to the museum where they

will be displayed.'



Artemis and the Artist

Those of you who have seen the museum's new exhibition, *Archie and the Poet*, will have noticed the exciting contribution artist Emi Fujisawa has made in better understanding Archie.

Emi is a Japanese textile artist/designer based in Oxfordshire specialized in hand weaving and natural dyeing. She launched her slow fashion collection using textiles and antique/vintage natural fabrics in 2021 which focused on nature, sustainability and the value of 'handmade'.

Emi said: 'I always have had a strong interest in textile conservation as I like to imagine what might be the history and background behind antique fabrics.

When I saw Archie for the first time, his patches reminded me of a Japanese textile technique called "boro". It was common practice in Japan to repair clothing and goods with hand stitching



using old fabrics borrowed from friends or family, making them more meaningful and special. I had the same feeling about Archie.

I am excited to be involved in this project for analysing Archie from the textile conservation point of view, but also having the opportunity to be involved in the creation of a 'new' Archie.'

Emi's 'new' Archie – named Artemis – can be viewed in the museum.

Art Journaling Workshop at the Museum

Draw, notice, stroll, write, relax, learn! This art journaling workshop and walk will enable you to explore some of the fascinating history and nature of the Ridgeway National Trail with Jo Beal, Wiltshire-based artist, and Sarah Wright, Ridgeway Officer.

The morning will be spent indoors at Tom Brown's School Museum in Uffington. Sarah will introduce some of the Trail's history and artefacts, and Jo will help you to capture your thoughts and observations in your journals with easy and accessible drawing techniques that will help build confidence.

In the afternoon, participants will take a gentle stroll from the National Trust car park to White Horse Hill to view the internationally renowned Bronze Age chalk figure of the White Horse. We will spend time looking, listening and journaling our experience of this ancient place, before heading back along The Ridgeway.
