This website is run by Uffington Museum Trust. We want as many people as possible to be able to use this website. For example, that means you should be able to:

- change colours, contrast levels and fonts
- zoom in up to 300% without the text spilling off the screen
- navigate most of the website using just a keyboard
- navigate most of the website using speech recognition software
- listen to most of the website using a screen reader (including the most recent versions of JAWS, NVDA and VoiceOver)

Compliance status

This website is partially compliant with the [Web Content Accessibility Guidelines version 2.1](#) AA standard, due to the non-compliances listed below.

Non-accessible content

The content listed below is non-accessible for the following reasons.

Non-compliance with the accessibility regulations

At present, some text, for example the titles of downloadable documents, do not meet the colour contrast specifications.

The selections on the main navigation do not highlight clearly as they are tabbed or selected.

There are a small number of images which contain text which do not have a HTML or text alternative.

Disproportionate burden

Navigation and accessing information

There's no way to skip the repeated content in the page header (for example, a 'skip to main content' option).

Some of the technical issues are inherent in the content management system we are using, "Weebly". However, we are working to find ways to optimise these within the scope of this CMS.

We've assessed the cost of fixing the issues with navigation and accessing information, and with interactive tools and transactions. We believe that doing so now would be a [disproportionate burden](#) within the meaning of the accessibility regulations. We will make another assessment when the supplier contract is up for renewal, likely to be in 2023.

Content that's not within the scope of the accessibility regulations

PDFs and other documents

Some of our PDFs and Word documents are essential to providing our services. For example, we have forms published as Word and PDF documents.

Any new PDFs or Word documents we publish will meet accessibility standards.

What we're doing to improve accessibility

We are continuing to review areas, such as colour schemes, to improve accessibility. This is an ongoing process.
